Fund Description

The 27four Stable Fund of Funds is a low risk multi-managed, multi-asset class portfolio providing asset class and fund manager diversification by investing in a combination of equity, listed property and fixed income funds, both locally and internationally. The primary objectives are capital protection and income generation.

Risk Profile



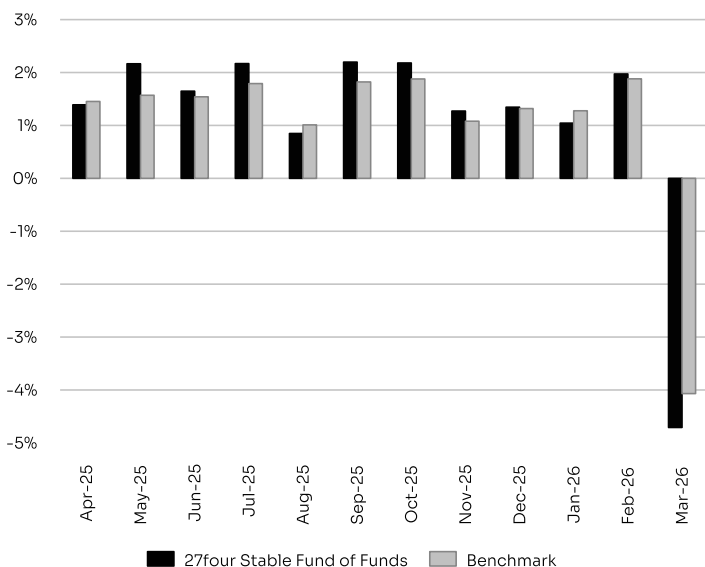
These portfolios are diversified across various asset classes. Generally low risk portfolios have low or no equity exposure resulting in lower volatility than more aggressive risk profiled portfolios. The probability of significant capital losses in any period is less likely, however expected potential long-term investment returns could be lower over the medium to long-term.

Fund Commentary

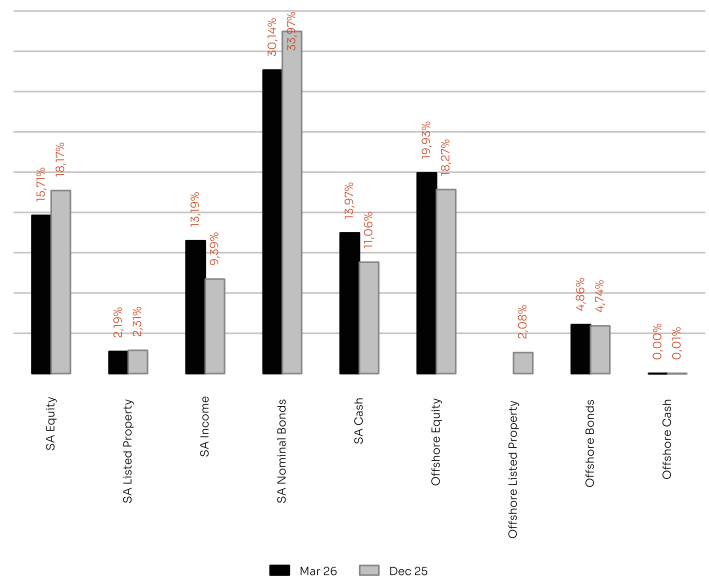
Financial markets entered 2026 on a firm footing, supported by easing inflation and broadly constructive macroeconomic environment. That stability proved short-lived. The outbreak of war between the US-Israel alliance and Iran in March upended conditions sharply, introducing an energy shock that reverberated across asset classes and geographies for the remainder of the quarter. Inflation had been on an improving trajectory through much of the quarter, but the outlook looks grim. In the US, CPI stood at 2.4% year-on-year in February (core: 2.5%). The UK recorded 3.0%, while South Africa's headline CPI eased to 3.0% from 3.5% in January. The euro area had reached 1.9% in February – but by March, the flash estimate had jumped to 2.5%, driven almost entirely by higher energy inflation, a stark reversal that foreshadowed what was coming elsewhere. Central banks responded with caution. The US Federal Reserve held the fed funds rate at 3.5%–3.75% at both its January and March meetings, citing elevated uncertainty and the evolving situation in the Middle East in its March meeting. The Bank of England kept the Bank Rate at 3.75% – first by a close vote in February, then unanimously in March – explicitly flagging inflation risks from rising energy and commodity prices. The ECB similarly held the deposit facility rate at 2.00% in both meetings while warning of increased upside inflation risks and downside growth risks. In South Africa, the SARB maintained the repo rate at 6.75% in January and March, acknowledging that oil, gas, and fertiliser prices had risen sharply and that the balance of inflation risks had shifted to the upside. Across the board, the message was the same: rates on hold, and the bar for hikes had risen. Against this backdrop, global equity markets retreated and leadership narrowed. The MSCI World Index shed 3.88% in US dollar terms for the quarter. The US and Europe ex-UK fell 4.80% and 4.60% respectively, while emerging markets and EM Asia were more resilient, declining just 0.51% and 1.78%. The clearest outperformers were Japan (+0.7%) and Latin America (+14.12%), both supported by commodity exposure and favourable regional dynamics. Style performance reinforced the same rotation: MSCI World Value rose 0.70% while MSCI World Growth fell 8.45%, as investors moved away from higher-valuation assets in an environment of resurgent inflation uncertainty. Locally, the picture was similarly mixed. The JSE ALSI ended the quarter marginally lower (-0.6%), as sharp March drawdowns erased the gains built in January and February. Resources held up (+7.15%), underpinned by earlier rallies in gold. Listed property weakened (ALPI -5.32%) under the spectre of higher rate and reduced risk appetite. The rand also came under significant pressure late in the quarter, with the SARB noting that the shock had weighed on emerging-market currencies broadly and contributed to rising bond yields locally. Fixed income bore the brunt of rising inflation fears and capital outflows, with yields moving sharply higher in March. The Bloomberg Global Aggregate Bond Index fell 1.07% in rand terms in the first quarter. Sovereign yields across the US, UK, Germany, and Japan reached multi-month or multi-year highs. Locally, the All-Bond Index (ALBI) declined 3.36% and inflation-linked bonds (CIL) fell 1.13%, while cash (STeFI) provided relative shelter at +1.66%. The speed of the reversal was striking. Bloomberg reported net foreign sales of R41.3bn in South African government bonds in a single week, a sharp reminder of how quickly emerging-market flows can turn during periods of global stress.

The 27four Stable Fund of Funds shed 1.82% in the first quarter, 80 basis points behind low-equity category average. The fund's underperformance was primarily driven by its overweight exposure to risk assets and a measured domestic bias, where equities and bonds plummeted significantly on the back of US-Iran war. Looking ahead, the near-term outlook remains uncertain. Markets will stay sensitive to developments in the Middle East, oil supply conditions, and the degree to which higher energy costs pass through into broader inflation. Upcoming CPI data, central bank meetings, and corporate earnings updates should provide clearer signals on whether the shock proves transitory or embeds more durably. The portfolio has remained consistent in adhering to its policy objective.

This yield is subject to change as market rates and underlying investments change.

Glossary

Annualised performance: Annualised performance show longer term performance rescaled to a 1 year period. Annualised performance is the average return per year over the period. Actual annual figures are available to the investor on request.

Best month: Largest increase in any single month.

Highest & lowest return: The highest and lowest returns over any 1 year period since the inception date.

Max drawdown: The maximum peak to trough loss suffered by the Fund since inception.

NAV: The net asset value represents the assets of a Fund less its liabilities.

Sharpe ratio: The Sharpe ratio is used to indicate the excess return the portfolio delivers over the risk free rate per unit of risk adopted by the fund.

Standard deviation: The deviation of the return stream relative to its own average.

Tracking error: The volatility of the difference in returns between a Fund and its Benchmark. Also known as active risk.

% positive months: The percentage of months since inception where the Fund has delivered positive return.

Fund Specific Risks

Currency exchange risk: Changes in the relative values of individual currencies may adversely affect the value of investments and any related income.

Default risk: The risk that the issuers of fixed income instruments (e.g. bonds) may not be able to meet interest payments nor repay the money they have borrowed. The issuers credit quality is vital. The worse the credit quality, the greater the risk of default and therefore investment loss.
